# From the Principal's Office

My name is Mark Crosson and I am the Principal at the Academy. I am very excited and happy to be serving in this capacity. I was most recently the Principal at Mifflin County High School, serving there for 11 years and retiring in 2022. A quick note before I give some important information below. The name of our newsletter comes from the fact that our mascot is an owl and a group of owls (a flock if you will) is called a parliament. Now onto the informational items:

- Parking passes at the Academy are awarded but due to very limited availability, we prioritize as follows: students enrolled in a co-op program through the Academy are given top priority, students who work after school and have been able to verify, through a letter from their employer, that their start time would necessitate that they leave from the Academy are given the second priority and those students who are full time Alpha (or another online platform and don't go to their the sending high school) are given the third priority.
- When a student is issued a parking pass, it is imperative that they understand that they are not permitted to haul other students unless permission is granted by the principal and the appropriate documentation is filed with the office. Finally, students driving from Mifflin County High School to the Academy are not permitted to stop at another location (i.e. home, a restaurant, etc.), they must drive directly to the Academy.
- **Absences** are recorded both at the Academy and the sending school, therefore please remember to send excuses to the home school as well as the Academy when your student is absent.

This year, all 5 third-year seniors received their Keystone Degree, along with 3 graduated members that returned to apply a second time. Applications were due October 31 and went through an extensive review process. This year they awarded 511 Keystone Degrees, putting our Big Valley FFA members in the top 3.22% of PA FFA members that earn this honor.

To earn the Keystone Degree, members must meet the following requirements:

- Earn or productively invest \$1,000 or work 300 hours outside of class time as part of their Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) project
- Maintain at least 2 years (24 consecutive months) of FFA membership
- Participate in at least 5 events above chapter level events
- Participate in at least 10 chapter level events
- Participate in at least 25 hours of community service
- Hold a leadership position within their FFA chapter or serve as a committee member
- Take a parliamentary procedure exam demonstrating knowledge of Robert's Rules of Order
- Deliver a 10 minute speech or lead a 40 minute class discussion


## **From our Electrical Installations Program**
